### I. Justice System

## Accessibility of courts (e.g. court/legal fees, legal aid, language)

Pushbacks remove people-on-the-move from the jurisdiction. Although, in theory possible, practically it is very challenging for them to access courts.

As pushbacks, by design, are attempts to remove people-on-the-move from the territory of Greece, many survivors are outside of the territory. Instigating legal proceedings from abroad is challenging, hindered by lack of legal aid and the difficulties of obtaining admissible letters of attorney and testimonies. Although in theory someone removed from the territory can make a legal complaint against other constituent crimes than the pushback itself, such as threat to life, removal from the territory makes it practically very challenging. Moreover, when victims return to Greece, they often cannot present themselves to the authorities for testimonies due to the risk of being arrested for illegal entry and being pushed back again (HumanRights360, https://bit.ly/3FHgMvJ).
